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### A Slow Death

Peter, our HRSC President showed me this article and asked if I could put something on our website about it. As I'm not a writer I don't know the proper way to explain this but I'll try the best I can.

Mr. Paddon talked about his personal Ethos and made suggestions about having a club Ethos. Here are his suggestions for a club Ethos.

- 1. Good governance takes effort.
- 2. We are not an old boys club.
- 3. Shooting is shooting no matter what discharges the projectile.
- 4. Volunteer organizations cannot be run by one percent of it's membership.
- 5. Training and development are important.
- 6. Change is normal and continuous improvement is what your organization should strive for.

#### Good governance takes effort.

In our case everything has already been done for us by the founding members except maintenance. The clubs bylaws have to be maintained to reflect any changes to the way we do business and yearly submittal. By that I mean if we change things like types of membership and requirements or even what time of the year we hold our AGM and filing with the government every year. At this time Peter, our president does all that so we don't have to worry, or do we. Peter is under a big load and probably does not want to do this forever so this is where organizational committees come into play to help offload some of the burdens of maintenance. We should be having more meetings except that hardly anyone shows up. I guess we should try quarterly or three regular meetings and the AGM as the forth.

#### We are not an old boys club.

This ones short. We definitely are not an old boys club. Everyone and everything that can shoot is welcome at the HRSC as long as it doesn't contravene any laws in Canada including our own bylaws, range rules and the HRSC's RSOS.

# Shooting is shooting no matter what discharges the projectile.

For the most part I think everyone in the HRSC supports any type of shooting sport. I myself am not critical of other types of shooting sports. I am a hand gunner first and do not disapprove or think trap or archery or even plinking is less important in our club.



As a club we have to represent all shooting disciplines one hundread percent. Like myself some of us may put more emphasis on one discipline more than another but thats just my personal enjoyment. If I shot trap or archery, that's probably what I would put my time into. As a membership in whole, we have to support all types of shooting activities. We are not an old boys club. Children, women, men, young and old are all encouraged to join our club and enjoy the shooting sport of their choice.

# Volunteer organizations cannot be run by one percent of it's membership.

We are a pretty small club as far as shooting clubs go so I understand why we have a hard time finding volunteers. It's hard to run a club with two, three, or four executive. We are but it's real hard and sooner or later some of the executive won't want to do their job because of burnout. Mr. Paddon writes, can your club achieve the 10-80-10 rule? 10 percent of the club holds the executive positions. For the size of our membership, the HRSC executive is about 3 percent of the membership. 80 percent of the membership is what Mr. Paddon calls the silent majority. They are the part of the membership that supports the "10 percent" executive, or in our case 3 percent executive. The executive delegates and the 80 percent help out where needed like club asset maintenance and or cleanup work bees. Help with committees. As Mr. Paddon puts it, "the last 10 percent of the club membership is the frustrating portion. They feel that since they pay dues, they have a right to complain about how the club is run by the first 10 percent group." In our case 3 percent. In short they are the complainers that will not make suggestions for improving the club as a whole. They will not help out or make themselves available for any club functions. In our club I'm not sure we have a lot of the last 10 percent. As an executive we have kind of dropped the ball as far as work bees and such. In our defense, with only three of us on the executive, it is kind of hard to plan any thing. This is why clubs have directors, committee chairs and committees.

Training and development are important.

The Range Rules and RSOS are posted on the website *www.hayrivershootingclub.org* and it's up to you to read and understand them.

As time goes on we will have a better training program. In the past when IPSC action shooting was strong and active in the NWT, the HRSC would put on a Black Badge course about once a year or as needed. In 2009 I had the privilege to attend a Defensive Handgun course. I believe the course was based on IDPA rules and was part of the qualification requirements for IDPA competitions. On July 5th HRSC will be hosting an in club qualification course for action handgun. This course will qualify you for competition in HRSC sanctioned events like league night and weekend shoots. The course will also qualify you as a range officer for HRSC sanctioned events. As far as other courses, it's up to you to tell us what you would like to see. I do long gun and handgun so my time will be used on those disciplines. If you want training or league shoots in other disciplines, let us know.
